THE COLLEGE CORNER

Time is just flying by here at Maruzen Hawthorne! (But, of course, what else would it do at an aviation school?). With nineteen full time students, and more enrolling each month as a new ground school begins, we are certainly keeping our instructors and aircraft very busy.

We have just purchased a second helicopter to accommodate students' needs. Our fleet now consists of three Cessna 172's, one Cessna 182, one Beechcraft Duchess, and two Robinson R-22 helicoptors. Our maintenance crew works nearly 'round the clock to keep our aircraft in excellent working order.

As a service to our own students and also to other student pilots, we have become a Drake Authorized Testing Center at the airport location. To qualify as a Center, we had to first have FAA approval.

"We can now provide cerification exams for aviation-related professions," said Gene Benson, Director of Aviation. "Ordinarily, candidates for these ratings wait weeks for results. With DATC, the entire testing process, including the scoring, is completely computerized. The agony of waiting is eliminated."

Wakako Shiu, teacher of our Japanese language and culture class, is just concluding another session with area students. We have heard from both students and teachers that classes are not only educational, but thoroughly enjoyable. We look forward to holding our next Japanese class in the fall, with dates to be announced.
