## ***ANTRIM'S SCHOOL TAX TO INCREASE DRAMATICALLY***

*from the Selectmen*

Based on the proposed budget presented by the Conval School District Board on Feb. 2, it has been calculated that Antrim's School Tax Rate will increase in 1993 by 14.7% or over \$350,000.

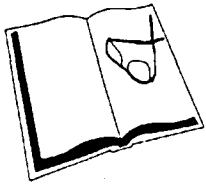
The major factor causing this large increase is that between 1990/91 and 1991/92 the number of children from Antrim attending school grew by about 10%. The current funding formula calculates 75% of each Town's share of the cost based on the number of pupils and 25% on the basis of property value.

While the amount of the tax increase may vary depending on the final budget adopted and the estimates of income used in setting the gross assessment, unfortunately the change will not be significant unless there is a major budget reduction.

We urge as many Antrim voters as possible to attend the Conval District Meeting on Saturday, March 6. While little can be done about this year's rate, it is important that we start a process that, at a minimum, will even out the large fluctuations in the rate, but more importantly, will provide a more equitable division of the cost.

OM stands for Odyssey of the Mind, a creative problem-solving competition which involves students from around the world. Teams of seven students work with a coach after school dealing with a long-term problem which results in a performance at the competitions. Students must also solve a spontaneous problem at the competition .

Last year Great Brook's team advanced to the state-level competition by placing as one of the top three teams in their selected problem and division. This year Great Brook boasts three teams and has hopes of advancing to the world competitions to be held in Maryland, to compete against teams from countries as far away as Japan, Germany and China.

Does anyone have a refrigerator box they would be willing to donate to the eighth grade OM team? Students must make/gather all their own scenery and props with a cost limit of \$80. No two teams from the same school in the same division can work on the same problem.

The long-term performances are free and open to the public. The competition takes place from 8am to 5pm. Come for part of all of the competition. Who knows? Great Brook could well send three teams to the state competition - and world?

## **NAME-THE-CAMP CONTEST**

Plans are underway for Camp Sachem's rebirth as a Girl Scout Camp. Swift Water Girl Scout Council, the new owners of the former Boy Scout Camp located along the shores of Gregg Lake, recently presented their proposed master plan to the Antrim Planning Board. A map of the 300 acre site was included, and Council members said that 180 acres will not be touched but left in the rough. The camp will initially be able to accommodate 150 campers and eventually grow to a maximum of 250.

Director of communications, Martha Netsch, explained that the future camp is a big project for the Girl Scouts. Plans have been developing since the purchase of the camp in 1991. They have made an effort to keep the town informed and appeared before the Planning Board as a courtesy.

The focal point of the camp will be the preservation of arts and crafts. Other program will include swimming and ecology. The camp will be open year round with most campers attending summer programs. A full-time ranger will be hired.

## TALES AND TRAILS

There are few places in Antrim that feel as removed from the modern world as the *Lily Pond*. Created by an enormous chunk of frozen glacial debris deposited during the last ice age, this "kettle hole" lies in a depression between rocky ledges just east of Holt Hill and southwest of the old Antrim Center. Originally just a few hundred feet in circumference, the pond now floods several acres of what was once wooded land. Weathered, silvery ghosts of trees stand as testimony to decades of beaver activity. The original kettle hole is easily discernable at the southwest side of the enlarged pond. It is a clear oval, ringed with bog cranberry, sphagnum moss, sedges and grasses, and rumored to be bottomless. There is a rocky island at the center of the Lily Pond, covered with a growth of Black Spruce, Hemlock and Birch. Beyond the pond, several large nests perch precariously in the dead tree-tops. This is a rookery, where Great Blue Herons return each year to raise their young. The sight of these long-necked and limbed birds taking off from the tops of trees conjures up images of pterodactyls flying across a primordial dawn.

Nature seems to dominate at the Lily Pond, but people found things to do there in centuries past. Although the pond is too acidic for most fish, there is speculation that it was used for ice cutting, and that the marsh grasses were mowed by hand. In the winters of the mid-1800's, children from the center school house would run up to the pond to skate during their lunch hour. Considering the distance, one might assume that these kids were hardier than subsequent generations. Or maybe the hours were longer back then.

The trail to the Lily Pond begins at the southwest corner of the Center Cemetery, located diagonally across Rte 31 from Maple Hill Farm and the Hurlin Recreation Area, just west of the Grange, where parking is possible. The trail crosses the stone wall, dips down and over a brook, then parallels another stone wall for several hundred yards. It then ascends gently through Hemlocks and hardwoods and meets with a old woods road which continues west to the pond. It is wise to allow at least an hour for the walk and exploration. The Walking Easement was deeded to the town in 1990 by the Ziegler Estate. The land on the eastern shore was given to the town as a Conservation Easement by Harry Page in 1991.

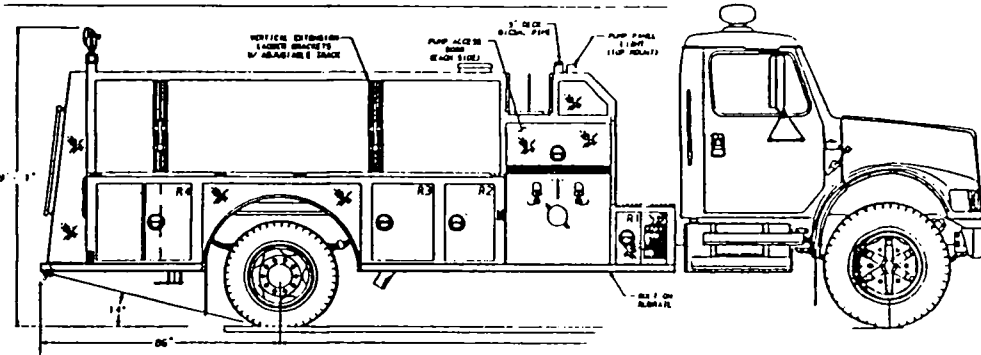

## **SUPPORT REQUESTED BY ANTRIM FIRE DEPARTMENT!**

The Antrim Fire Department is asking for your support at

## **PARKS AND REC SPONSORS PETITION FOR COORDINATOR**

*Antrim Parks and Recreation Commission*, in conjunction with *Friends of Recreation*, has sponsored a petition warrant to hire a part-time coordinator to manage recreational programs and facilities (town gym, ball field, tennis courts, basketball court, etc.) This part-time person would be paid \$6/hr (20 hrs a wk, \$6,240 yr) to schedule and supervise all use of the town gym, schedule volunteers to work the Community Center, schedule athletic fields, work with coaches and sports leagues, work with janitor to insure town gym is properly maintained and cleaned. The Coordinator would work with all groups private and public to facilitate greater usage of the recreational facilities, and work to expand scope and quality of programming available to the public.

The approximate \$14,000 voted yearly for *Antrim Parks and Rec* covers such expenses as lifeguard salaries, supplies, repairs and maintenance of beach and town basketball/tennis court, town gym (asphalt, fences, sand, etc.). The annual budget does not cover such costs as janitors, organizers, sports equipment, and improvements. *Friends of Recreation* (a private, non-profit organization of volunteers to support and promote youth activities in Antrim) works hand-in-hand with *Parks and Rec Commission* to raise extra funds needed for equipment,

promote and staff new programs, and improve town facilities beyond what the town provides through the annual budget. Many volunteers already put in long hours on both the *P&R Commission* and the *Friends of Recreation*; and feel that a paid, part-time coordinator would facilitate and greatly improve the quality of programs and support their efforts

*Parks and Rec* needs your input and support! Meetings are held at 7:30pm, the first Monday of every month, at the Town Hall. **The public is welcome and encouraged to come, to share your thoughts and ideas - it's YOUR tax money!** Upcoming issues: janitorial services and security for Town Gym; policies and procedures (including sign-up, usage fee to cover cleaning, damage, etc.)

## **TOWN MEETING IS COMING March 9 and 11, 1993**

As this is written most if not all decisions have been reached as to the various items that will be up for discussion and vote at Town Meeting.

Of course there will be the regular Town Budget which will be a little under last year's budget but over last year's actual. In addition the following Warrant Articles will appear:

1. A request for about \$30,000 to hold a full revaluation of all Town property. We feel that this is absolutely essential if there is to be any fairness within the Town as to who pays what share of the taxes to be raised.
2. A request for a new Fire engine to replace the 1956 pumper. The cost of \$124,000 would come half from Capital Reserves and half from a 5-year financing plan.
3. A vote on a bond issue to raise Antrim's share of the cost of closing the municipal section of the Tri-Town landfill. The bond issue will be slightly under \$540,000.
4. A vote to adopt a street numbering plan. With the coming of a statewide 911 system this is essential for quick and accurate location of emergency callers.
5. Adoption of an ordinance relative to the operation of the Recycling/Transfer Center will also be on the Warrant.
6. The normal additional Warrants, ie Capital Reserves etc. will also be proposed for the voters' consideration.
