

Welcome to Our New Recreation Director!

Jane Jackson, Antrim's newly hired Recreation Director, can be found in her office in the Community Center at the Town Gym on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of each week. Her phone number is 588-3121. Jane is essentially an environmentalist as well as recreation director. Her background includes work at the MacDowell Dam in Peterborough, 3 years with the Army Corps of Engineers at Hopkinton Dam, work with the National Park Service, and Trail Maintenance through the Harris Center. Jane lives in Concord.

Beginner billiards lessons will be given the first Thursday of every month, starting June 3. Two classes of one-hour lessons (4 children per class) will be given from 6-8 pm. Master Plan Update

The Antrim Planning Board has begun the important task of updating the town's Master Plan. Required by state law, Master Plans help towns to project future land-use patterns as well as identify existing problems and needs. They lay out general land-use goals that are then implemented by zoning ordinances, capital improvements, and other public or private efforts. Antrim's Master Plan was last updated in 1985.

Throughout the rest of this year and well into the next, the Planning Board will seek citizen input by holding numerous public hearings and distributing a questionnaire. In addition, town department heads are being asked to identify problems and recommend changes in such areas as police protection, sewer and water, conservation, and taxation. The Planning Board also intends to make a special effort to address Antrim's depressed business climate.

We urge all Antrim residents to participate in the Master Planning process. Dates for public hearings will soon be publicized in the Peterborough Transcript and at the Town Hall. Copies of the existing Master Plan may be read at the Tuttle Library. Additional copies are for sale at the Town Hall for \$10.

With strong citizen involvement, we can create a Master Plan that serves as an action plan for helping Antrim become a more vibrant, well-rounded community.

Antrim Players Cast *Fiddler on the Roof*

Casting has been completed for the Antrim Players' production of *Fiddler on the Roof* to be presented in the Town Hall August 4-7. Susan Bartlett is directing the 1964 hit musical, with Robert Ball of Marlborough as Musical Director and Susan Levine of Keene as Choreographer. It is the first time the Players have had the privilege of working with these three professionals.

The part of Tevye, a milkman in 1905 Russia, will be played by Greenfield's Chief of Police, Gary Gagnon, who recently starred as *The Man Who Came to Dinner* and kept things on an even keel in *Guys and Dolls*, singing "Sit Down, You're Rocking the Boat." Trudy Dean of Hancock has been cast as Golde, his wife.

The story, based on *Tevye and His Daughters* by Sholom Aleichem, is largely concerned with the marrying off of their three oldest daughters. Jane Winslow, a veteran Player, as Yente the matchmaker thinks a suitable match could be made for one of them with the widowed Lazar Wolf, a middle-aged butcher, played by Fred Roberts. Fred has been a part of Players' productions for many years as actor, technical director, and, most recently, artistic director of *George Washington Slept Here*.

However, a dream sequence convinces Tevye that the young Tzeitel should marry her childhood friend Motel, the tailor. The young lovers will be played by Jen Krawiecki and Dean Proctor. The supporting cast of actors/singers/dancers is made up of familiar faces and newcomers from Antrim and several surrounding towns. For ticket information, watch the local papers and look for posters.

This year's production of *Fiddler* will be a celebration of 75 years of local theatre in the Antrim Town Hall, and tribute

will be given to some of the people who have kept "Tradition" alive. Although dramatic groups have thrived in Antrim since the middle of the nineteenth century, the late Dorothy Proctor, long-time actress and director, set March 1918 as the birth of the modern day Players. At that time a musical revue was produced for the benefit of the local Red Cross chapter, directed by Charles Prentiss, Miss Sadie Lane and Miss Ethel Proctor. It was advertised as a "Minstrel Show" although the theme was patriotic and the settings war-related. One member of the cast, Nellie Mudge Thornton, who graced the Town Hall stage many times in subsequent Players' productions, still resides in Antrim.

Pet News

It's Not Just a Shot

Most pet owners and animal lovers are very good about taking care of their pets. They provide good nutrition, plenty of exercise, and regular grooming to keep them healthy.

Many well-meaning but budget-conscious owners go so far as to give their pets' vaccination shots themselves, but is this really in the pet's best interest?

Vaccines are easy to get and not that hard to give, but most vets do much more than give "Fluffy" a quick jab and let it go at that.

Pets, like people, need to have regular health check-ups. Once a year is good for the first five or six years, but twice a year is probably better in older animals because their bodies change so rapidly as they get older.

A good physical examination can reveal many warning signals of impending health problems waiting to happen. Serious dental disease or other mouth problems can lead to kidney failure, liver disease, or heart disease. Lumps and bumps could be early signs of cancer. Heart murmurs or other abnormal sounds in the chest heard by trained ears with a stethoscope can detect early signs of congestive heart failure and other cardiopulmonary diseases.

Intact pets (non-neutered males and unspayed females) lead the pack with more than their share of problems as do overweight animals.

If not needed locally, the shop will channel the clothes to needy families elsewhere. Thank you notes from recipients of these clothes attest to the worthiness of these donations.

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
